Rick and Nikki are a husband and wife team who collaborate on pieces, drawing influence from their working class backgrounds, Greek narrative pottery, and comic book illustration. Their collaborative works have been shown throughout the United States. Both teach at Salisbury Univ.

Artists' Statement

The current work is a collaboration consisting of Blown glass sculptures and vessels that utilize cameo sandblasted imagery. The imagery is a social commentary meant to be poignant and satirical. This can range from waiting for a bus, going to see a doctor, bowling, a day at the beach, or any vocation. We want our message to be understandably simply at first glance. The viewer will interpret more into the piece based on their experience.

The Juror: Natalie Bray

Associate curator at the Contemporary Art Center of Virginia (CAC), is originally from Virginia Beach, Virginia, she received a BFA in Studio Art



from James Madison University in 2000. and a MFA in photography from the Savannah College of Art and Design (SCAD) in 2004. Upon graduation, Bray joined the exhibitions department at SCAD where she worked for 2 and a half years as a curator of 15 galleries located in Savannah, Atlanta and Lacoste,

France. She joined CAC in 2006.

Juror's Statement

Glass, as a medium, is embedded with great potential for poetic virtuosity. This year's award winners distinguished themselves by their understanding of the properties of the medium, and an application of this understanding to the concept of each piece. Beyond simply beautiful configurations, these artists used the attributes and language of their glass to transcend the materiality of form and function.

The <u>Best in Show</u> selection is visually striking and conceptually seductive. The <u>HAC Award</u> selection has a machine-like perfection to its form, yet relates to a soft, delicate and romantic element of nature. The <u>2nd Place</u> selection allows the inherent properties of heated glass to appear vulnerable and tenuous. The <u>3rd Place</u> selection is a selfcontained, opaque pattern of spirals encompassed in an energized disk. This piece operates as an emotive sign using symbolically translucent material.

The Guild

This marks the 21st year for the non-profit Peninsula Glass Guild. It was established in 1986 to promote quality art glass in the community and to provide a forum for glass artists to gather together for educational and support purposes. This also marks the 19th annual members show for the Guild. Membership includes both professional and non-professional glass artists.

PGG offers workshops for members to encourage continual growth. Trips to see glass and related arts, meetings featuring guest lecturers, and the Annual Glass Show are but a few of the membership benefits.

Each year, the Guild creates a large piece of glass and donates it to a public organization. This piece is funded by the Guild and donations, group designed, constructed, and installed by the Guild. Pieces are now displayed at the Newport News SPCA, the Virginia Living Museum, the Charles H. Taylor Arts Center, the Yorktown Victory Center, the Virginia Air and Space Center in Hampton, Shelton on the Bay in Phoebus, the Newport News Main Street Library, the Virginia Holocaust Museum in Richmond, and the Norfolk Botanical Garden. The Guild co-purchased a significant piece of glass for the Chrysler Museum in 1998.
